REPORTS FROM PROVINCIAL REPRESENTATIVES

Viking in the eastern part of our province is in the process of forming a chapter – they had their inaugural meeting in October which included a presentation on Delirium in older adults.

We are concerned as an association about the impact of a new 'limited travel' policy from AHS that may result in few staff being granted permission to travel to educational events, such as our provincial association education meeting and AGM (scheduled for April 5, 2013 in Red Deer) and our National CGNA Conference in BC in May. We are exploring the possibility of broadcasting our provincial education session via WebX type technology to allow staff to attend virtually. We are also exploring changing our bylaws to allow for attendance at our AGM in a virtual fashion (e.g. by teleconference or WebX type technology).

We have decided to no longer publish a paper type newsletter but will communicate with our members via other means: social network (Facebook) and via email and web page updates.

We will continue to offer study groups in Calgary (broadcast by Telehealth) and Edmonton and possibly Lethbridge to assist RNs to prepare to write the C.N.A. certification exam in Gerontology.

As of Nov 21, we have 210 members (192 RN, 4 LPN, 4 RPN, 4 student (nurses pursuing further education); and 6 associate members (non-practicing nurses). At the April 2012 conference we changed our bylaws to create a new membership category of 'retired' – this will allow retired members to continue to be active in our association.

The evening started with Ron Cross from Random Acts of Rhythm, who facilitated a welcoming drum circle. Our key note speaker was Dr. Veronique Boscart, CIHR Schlegel Research Chair in Enhanced Seniors Care at the Research Institute on Aging, University of Waterloo and Conestoga College. Veronique delivered a powerful talk titled, "Putting Living First – Changing Education, Practice and Care." We had 90 people in attendance who also had the pleasure of talking with Mrs. Ida Herbert, the Guinness Book of World Records Oldest Yoga Instructor.
